FIELD WORK

2014-Present *Emigration and Crime*: This project addresses the potential link between mass emigration and crime in modern Mexico. For this study I am gathering homicide data from each of Mexico's 2,445 municipalities with the purpose of comparing homicide trends while controlling for levels of emigration. I am also conducting interviews with officials and key informants living in migrant-sending regions in central Mexico.

2013-Present *Return Migration*: In this project I focus on the long-term effects of emigration on Mexican communities. Specifically, I study the impact of return migrants on community wellbeing. To this end, I am compiling data from multiple state sources and conduct interviews with local officials and former migrants.

2008-2013 *Research of Mexican Hometown Associations (HTAs)*: Interviews conducted with grassroots organizers/leaders and government officials in the U.S. and Mexico. This study focused on the role of migrants in underpinning development in rural Mexico. A major element of this project has involved the gathering and compilation of data on the Mexican program *3 X 1 para migrantes* into a central database that I can use to evaluate the investment patterns of HTAs in rural Mexico. This project uses both quantitative and qualitative methods.

The project, which engages Adams State University students in field research, focuses on the relationship between immigration, sustainable development, and land management in the region. This project is supported by generous grants from Title V (\$5,000), the Bureau of Land Management (\$95,000), and the Sangre de Cristo National Heritage Area (\$15,000). Research for this project is underway and is scheduled to run through 2016.
