Student Presentations	<u>WebEx</u> Zoom (Help Guide)	Students record themselves giving a presentation and upload the file to Moodle. They can use <u>screencast-o-matic</u> or <u>Snagit</u>
Assign Readings, articles, etc.		Moodle offers a variety of ways to present resources:
		<ul> <li><u>Book</u>—Multi-page resources with a book-like format. <i>Teachers can export their Books as IMS</i> <i>CP</i> (admin must allow teacher role to export IMS)</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>File</u>—A picture, a pdf document, a spreadsheet, a sound file, a video file</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>Folder</u>—For helping organize files and one folder may contain other folders</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>IMS content package</u>—Add static material from other sources in the standard IMS content package format</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>Label</u>—Can be a few displayed words or an image used to separate resources and activities in a topic section, or can be a lengthy description or instructions</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>Page</u>—The student sees a single, scrollable screen that a teacher creates with the robust HTML editor</li> </ul>
		<ul> <li><u>URL</u>—You can send the student to any place they can reach on their web browser, for example Wikipedia</li> </ul>

\*Synchronous refers to activities occurring at the same time. For example, students logged into a WebEx meeting room at a scheduled day/ time with their professor.

\*\*Asynchronous refers to activities occurring independently without requiring participation at the same time. For example, creating an assignment with a due date, but students can work on the assignment off-line at a time convenient for them.
