

Intermediate Bahasa Indonesia

INDO-2003-2503 (3 credits)

Indonesia: Arts, Religion, and Social Change

This syllabus is representative of a typical semester. Because courses develop and change over time to take advantage of unique learning opportunities, actual course content varies from semester to semester.

Course Description

This intermediate level language course is designed to further develop students' basic level proficiency in Indonesian. Although primary emphasis is placed on developing listening and speaking skills, reading and writing skills are also highly integrated to reinforce students' comprehension both in oral and written form. The course aims to extend students' knowledge of basic spoken and written Indonesian by learning more complex sentence and word structures. These include, amongst others, (i) combining clauses in sentences and (ii) more types of affixes that are not covered in the basic level. These topics are integrated during practicing the aforementioned language skills.

Throughout the semester, students are encouraged to apply their language skills in all facet of the programs to increase fluency while maintaining accuracy. The cultural component of the language learning and the constant culture-exposure assignments are expected to sharpen students' cultural appropriacy in using the Indonesian language. By the end of the course, students should be able to listen and speak both formal and informal Indonesian with more advanced vocabulary and complex structures.

Language Levels and Placement

Students are placed into appropriate language course level based on oral proficiency interviews or placement test conducted during orientation period.

Learning Outcomes

The *Intermediate Bahasa Indonesia* course comprises 45 hours of instruction (3 credits). Upon completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Successfully communicate information or engage in a discussion on daily functions
- Acquire more complex vocabularies and grammatical structures necessary for participating in semi-complicated conversation, such as negotiating transactions in public spaces
- Employ Indonesian language in conversation about familiar topics in more descriptive and detailed information

- Write short letters and notes with straightforward information using formal Indonesian language
- Describe goals and methods of their ISP in simple narration in Indonesian

Course Requirements

Methodology

All language classes will be conducted by trained Indonesian language instructors who are native speakers of the language. With an oral-proficiency based approach, students are expected to learn more examples and have more speaking practices in the class. Language groups and instructors may rotate following the course components of the program and therefore students will have various learning environments that may be beneficial for their learning process. In addition to the class time, students will be immersed in a more informal learning through interacting with the homestay and other community members. Students will also have opportunities to speak with local university students throughout the semester.

Textbook and Course Supplements

The textbook used for this course is the excerpts from *Bahasa Indonesia untuk Mahasiswa SIT Study Abroad Indonesia Tingkat Menengah*, an Indonesian Language for Intermediate Students of SIT Study Abroad Indonesia, currently being developed by the language team. This book will incorporate the course components of the program to align the themes and focus with more complex grammar and intensive readings as compared to the book's other version used for the Beginner levels. At this intermediate level, language instructors also integrate current issues and events in Indonesia by discussing articles from mass media or online news.

Daily Class Schedule

- Classes are scheduled around 2 hours every day with more class hours during orientation time.
- Each class begins with a review session, including a warming-up exercise, homework discussion, or simple conversation in Indonesian that every student is invited to participate actively.
- There is a language tutorial where students are expected to meet the instructors in one-on-one format once a week. Students are asked to answer questions orally to practice their speaking skills and to correct or improve their pronunciations.
- Quiz is conducted after completion of some learning chapters/themes for assessment on students' understanding.
- Students are given assignments in various forms such as getting new vocabulary from their homestay, recording themselves practising the language on the field, or write simple essay of their chosen topic.

- Students take a written mid-term exam and two final oral exams before and after ISP period

Office Hours by appointment

The language instructors may have additional office hours by appointment for students who need further support.

Overview of Course Content

Course Topics

- Greetings and small talks
- Introducing oneself and others
- Identifying objects and their owners
- Complex numbers and time
- Asking and giving detail directions
- Weather and Seasons
- Expressing likes and dislikes and other feelings
- Describing extended family

Language Structures

- Vowel agreement
- Personal and possessive pronouns
- Question endings
- Question words and particles
- Word order in sentences
- Superlative and comparative adjectives

Exercises and Assignments

Many exercises integrating language and FME (Field Method and Ethics) are carried out throughout the semester. After learning the thematic course and the language parts to use for the specific setting, students will be sent out to the field to engage with the locals and put their classroom instructions into practice. This way they can enrich their classroom learning experience, assimilate real-life language situations and eventually immerse in the host cultural situations. Students are also tasked to conduct informal interview with the homestay families and so providing more opportunity for students to practice their Indonesian language. As a complement to the language classes, homestay conversations encourage students to utilize their language skills continuously.

Evaluation and Grading Criteria

Instructors evaluate students' performance based on observation, assignments, quizzes and exams given throughout the course. Final grades are assigned by the Director in consultation

with the language instructors based on the instructors' evaluation, the students' own self-evaluation, and the Director's observation of the students' participation in classes and their efforts to use the language outside of the classroom.

Methods of Evaluation

Quizzes and Assignments (20%)

Quizzes are conducted for constant assessment of students' understanding of the lessons and used to plan and structure subsequent classes accordingly. Assignment in any forms are assessed to understand how the students put their language knowledge into context.

Written exam (20%)

Students take one written exam in the middle of the semester that includes short answers, understanding elaborate text and write answers in full sentences.

Oral exam (30%)

Two oral exams: pre-ISP and post-ISP oral exams are used to assess students' language ability before and after being in the field for the ISP period. The format is identical to the one-on-one language tutorial conducted in weekly basis with the difference on the duration and number of questions asked. Students may choose the instructor with whom they are most comfortable to speak to, and the instructor will evaluate their communication skills, including pronunciations, grammar as well as their fluency and accuracy in the conversation.

Language Use Outside Class (10%)

Students are expected to be positive and enthusiastic towards the language learning and therefore the active and creative motivation to use the language beyond classroom are highly appreciated. The language instructors observe and keep track of the students' use of language in various settings outside the class, e.g. during homestays, conversation on the car drives or during site visits, or the students' interactions with other community members, lecturers, and friends. These notes are taken into consideration for the final evaluation of the student's progress.

Attendance and Classroom Participation (10%)

Regular attendance and active participation in all classes and other language activities is vital to language learning. Participation should be positive, consistent and productive. If students get sick or have other important appointment, they need to inform the instructor, and additional class can be provided based on appointment.

Motivation (10%)

Students should demonstrate continuing interest and keep their motivation by asking questions, initiating consultations with language teachers when required as well as constantly extending their Indonesian vocabulary beyond classroom. Students are responsible for completing all assignments and making up any missed graded items in their absence.
